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SXUK Completes Four Years The Dream that Counts

History is not a mere collection of some chronological events; it is a chronicle of the defining moments that go on to shape the future; and these defining moments are always unassuming in their contemporary perspectives. One such defining moment was the dream to take the institution to newer heights, and the

wheels were set in motion for establishing St. Xavier's University, Kolkata.

Like Rome was not built in a day, so also, the University did not come into existence on one fine moment. It was the culmination of numerous momentous events that served as milestones in the path of the establishment of this Jesuit Higher Education Institution.

St. Xavier's University was conceived in 2011, when Father Felix Raj, SJ, the then principal of St. Xavier's College, Kolkata, along with the members of the St. Xavier's College Alumni Association envisaged 'SXC Vision 2020', which encompassed the establishment of St. Xavier's University. It was established with a desire to deepen human understanding and create an excellent institution for teaching - learning, scholarship, research, innovation and outreach and thus form young men and women of competence, commitment, conscience and compassion who will be sensitive citizens and selfless leaders of the future.

In January 2012, when the Hon'ble Chief Minister of West Bengal, Mamata Banerjee, graced the Convocation of St. Xavier's College, she proposed to Fr. Felix Raj that St. Xavier's College be upgraded to the status of a University or a separate University be established under the Jesuit banner. The Government of West Bengal extended its valuable support to the Jesuits by granting 17 acres of land for the St. Xavier's University Campus to be built in New Town, Rajarhat. And we heard the ancient voice of history beckoning us.

The seed of a University had been embedded in St. Xavier's College since its inception in 1860. History reveals that the College was in a mode of expansion in many ways. The hallmark of the College, as stated in the almanacs of 1880 and onwards, observes that 'the course of study embraces all subjects and transcends the standards of post-graduation.

Again the Rector's Report of 1906 refers to an inspection by a body of members appointed by the Senate of the Calcutta University. The observations made by the members found St. Xavier's with the ability of expansion into further spheres of education, appreciating the prospect and proposal of upgradation into the status of a University.

Subsequently, as the Principal of the College, Fr. Felix Raj appointed a committee to prepare a DPR (Detailed Project Report). The committee had many meetings and prepared a draft of the St. Xavier's University, Kolkata Bill 2016. It also had several meetings with the Higher Education Department of the State Government to take this proposal forward.

With the support of the Alumni Association the 'Vision 2020' project began. The Alumni Association and some individual alumni participated whole-heartedly and actively in this 'Vision 2020'. It has been a hard task and the perseverance has borne fruit by the blessings of the Almighty.

The Hon'ble Chief Minister of West Bengal, Mamata Banerjee laid the Foundation Stone on December 27, 2013, blessed by His Grace, Most Rev. Archbishop Thomas D'Souza in the presence of Fr. Jeyaraj Veluswamy, S.J., Provincial, Fr. Dr. John Felix Raj, S.J., Principal, Rev. Dr. Dominic Savio, S.J., Rector and many other distinguished guests and alumni.

The St. Xavier's University, Kolkata Act 2016 was unanimously passed by the West Bengal Assembly on December 15, 2016. The Hon'ble Governor, Shri Keshari Nath Tripathi gave his consent to the Act on January 16, 2017 and the West Bengal Government notified February 8, 2017 (Foundation Day) as the date of effect for the provisions of the St. Xavier's University, Kolkata Act 2016 to come into force. The Government of West Bengal, particularly the Department of Higher Education was extremely cooperative. Mr. Vivek Kumar, the Principal Secretary of the H.E. Dept deserves our gratitude for his generous advice and wholehearted support to our new venture.

Fr. Jeyaraj Veluswamy, the President of the sponsoring trust and ex-officio Chancellor of the University appointed Fr. Felix Raj, S.J. as the first Vice-Chancellor of the University on January 15, 2017 along with Prof. Ashis Mitra as the first Registrar of the University. He took over the mantle immediately and formed the first Governing Board which had its first meeting on April 27, 2017. Britto House, which is the Jesuit residence, was inaugurated on the same day.

St. Xavier's University, Kolkata was inaugurated on July 7, 2017 by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of West Bengal, Mamata Banerjee, in the presence of Mr. Lakshmi Niwas Mittal, the Chairman and CEO of Arcelor Mittal, Fr. Jeyaraj Veluswamy, S.J., the Jesuit Provincial and several other dignitaries.

The Hon'ble Chief Minister expressed her firm belief that 'St. Xavier's University will soon be of global significance, like the Harvard and the Oxford. The Jesuit principles of faith and service would enable St. Xavier's University to become one of the foremost educational institutions in the country, promoting excellence in education and research". Mr. Mittal observed, "Today is a great day for Xavier's Fr. Felix Raj and I have been dreaming of this day for some years now, since we met in London in 2017. The dream has now become a reality.'

The Academic Block was named, 'Lakshmi and Usha Mittal Foundation Building', as a token of gratitude for the generous support of Mr. L.N. Mittal and family towards the construction of the building.

The first Academic session began on July 10, 2017 with two undergraduate courses in B.Com and B.M.S. and four postgraduate Courses in M.A. English, M.Com, M.A. Mass Communication, and MSW with a total strength of 400 students selected from among 3,500 applicants.

Xavier Business School (XBS) was inaugurated with the AICTE-approved fully-residential MBA course on August 7, 2018. With the approval of the Bar Council of India (BCI) SXUK started the Xavier Law School (XLS) on July 6, 2019. The University offers eight undergraduate courses, seven postgraduate courses and five Ph.D. programmes. It plans to open a Faculty of Science with Computer Science and Statistics and a course in Philosophy from 2022.

Infrastructure plays an important role in the education sector. Buildings, good classrooms, libraries, auditoriums, laboratories, green-clean campuses, ICT facilities, residential facilities on campus etc. are crucial for a learning environment and to improve the performance of students. We believe that high-quality



Education – Jesuit pathway to serve God and humanity

Evangelization, education and health services have been the three main strands of the mission of the church in India right from the first century when St. Thomas, the Apostle of Jesus landed on the

Malabar Coast, Kerala, South India. Preaching and teaching, sharing and serving, healing and empowering comprised the main activities of Christian missionaries down the centuries.

Later in the 16th century, with the arrival of Jesuit Missionaries in 1542 in Goa, spearheaded by St. Francis Xavier, the first Jesuit missionary cum educationist, Jesuit Educational system was introduced in India both in the Portuguese territories and in the territories of various Indian kingdoms. Their first college, St. Paul's College, was thus established in 1548 in Goa and similarly a St. Paul's College in the Portuguese settlement of Hugli, in 1614 in Bengal.

A Jesuit University in India - A long held dream!

The idea of a Catholic University or a Jesuit University in India appeared way back in 1915 in the Catholic Herald of Bengal. It read thus:

Why not a Catholic University?

'Speaking of St. Joseph's College Trichinopoly, I may mention of the magnificent work of the late Father Sewell, SJ who was practically the architect of that institution. The college was at first located at Nagapattinam, and its students who numbered about 300, mostly belonged to the French settlement of Karikal and Pondicherry. Trichinopoly on the other hand possessed a flourishing Mission College of the S.P.G. When Father Sewell

transferred the college from Nagapattinam to Trichinopoly, he met with overwhelming opposition from the rival institution as well as from the orthodox Hindu population. Today, the same institution has more than 2000 students, of whom 600 are Catholics. The Orthodox Hindus send their boys to the institution in preference to any other Mission College, while poor Catholic boys have always found its doors open to them. There is a proposal to erect a memorial for Father Sewell, but in what form, it is not yet decided. Why should it not be a Catholic University?' (Catholicus)

This long cherished dream would see the light of day, not before nearly a century would since roll by. Thus, 2013 saw the first Jesuit University, Xavier University Bhubaneswar (now XIM University) established in Odisha, though it was not the first Catholic University in India. The Assam Don Bosco University, Guwahati and the Christ (deemed to be) University Bangalore, were already set up by the Salesian Fathers of Don Bosco, and the Congregation of Carmelites of Mary Immaculate, respectively, in 2008.

St Xavier's University Kolkata – an incredible institution

“The truth is that divine inspiration and human collaboration have met and commissioned the creation of St. Xavier's University, Kolkata, as it gets ready to impart quality education irrespective of caste, creed or community.” I recall I had penned down these lines in an article in *The Telegraph* on July 7, 2017, the day St. Xavier's University Kolkata was inaugurated. Today, as SXUK completes its first four crucial years, it is once again more and more evident that whatever has been achieved in this short span of four years, namely the robust infrastructures, 8 UG courses, 7 PG courses, 5 Ph.D courses, MBA (Xavier Business School) and XLS (Xavier Law School), hostel facilities for over 600 men and

Therefore, their service and contribution deserve to be gratefully acknowledged and placed on record at this important juncture, when SXUK completes four years of incredible growth and service in the city of Kolkata. Needless to state that the Jesuit community is the backbone of SXUK life and mission. Another new dimension of SXUK is that two experienced diocesan priests are inducted to teach at SXUK: Dr. John Romus and Dr. S Francis, in addition to Fr. J. R. February 28, 2017- a 58 year old highly placed PSU employee was returning home after his farewell party looking forward to a happily retired life after 34 years of hard-work, when he suddenly received a phone call.

March 1, 2017 – The retired PSU employee was happily appointed as the first Liaison Officer of St. Xavier's University, Kolkata.

Many of those who have interacted with me in the last five years, know about my association with St. Xavier's University, Kolkata (SXUK). But my association with SXUK goes back even further. I had the privilege of serving as the Senior Vice President of St. Xavier's College (Calcutta) Alumni Association for many years and it was during this time that SXCAA under the leadership of Rev. Fr. John Felix Raj, SJ, conceived the dream of setting up St. Xavier's University, Kolkata.

During the Convocation at St. Xavier's College in 2012 the Hon'ble Chief Minister of West Bengal, Mamata Banerjee floated the idea of setting up a University or upgrading the college to a University. Subsequently, a think tank was formed under the able leadership of Rev. Fr. John Felix Raj, SJ, the then Principal of St. Xavier's College which started working to make this dream a reality.

It was on December 27, 2013 that the Foundation Stone was laid for the University campus at Rajarhat. I remember that I had spent three nights along with some friends from the SXCAA (the army without arms) at the land in Rajarhat to ensure that it is ready for the ceremony. The land where the SXUK campus stands now, was then a 17-acre jungle.

For the next few months, we met on every Tuesday in Room 15 of St. Xavier's College under the leadership of

Rev. Fr. Felix Raj to brainstorm and discuss the way ahead for making the dream of St. Xavier's University a reality. This was also the time when SXCAA put all its resources together to help realise the dream of the University.

On December 16, 2016, when the St. Xavier's University Kolkata Bill was passed in the West Bengal Assembly, it was a significant moment for us all. The dream was gradually meeting the light of day. I hardly knew then that my association with the University would grow stronger in the days to come.

Like a satisfied old man, I was looking forward to a relaxed and leisurely retired life free from all worries and hectic activities. I had turned fifty-eight and February 28, 2017

was my last working day at Air India. I was returning home after a farewell party organised by my colleagues. Sitting in the car, I was thinking about where my next holiday trip would be. Just then, I received a call from Rev. Fr. John Felix Raj, who told me,

“GP, meet me tomorrow. I want you to walk with me in the journey of making St. Xavier's University.”

I was happy to receive the call. I was already a part of the SXUK journey. The very next day when I went to meet father, he appointed me as the first Liaison Officer of St. Xavier's University, Kolkata. His words still resonates in my ears. I am not capable enough to walk 'along' with a great man like Father, but feel privileged that he has considered me worthy enough of serving this institution. I was wondering how much a tired and retired man would contribute, but I readily agreed. The army without arms is always ready in the service of the institution.

The next few years have been a wonderful journey. It is indeed a special feeling to be associated continuously with an institution which I have seen being built brick-by-brick. It is a great feeling to see the bare land gradually turning

The Association, established in 2020 presently has 1200 members. It is emerging gradually as one of the most vibrant and active Alumni Associations of the Jesuits. I am now happy, not only to be associated with SXUK as its Liaison Officer, but also a Founding Governing Body Member of St. Xavier's University Kolkata Alumni Association.

The establishment and the subsequent growth of St. Xavier's University, Kolkata, could not have been possible without the leadership of Rev. Fr. John Felix Raj – a visionary and a personality par excellence. St. Xavier's University is history in the making; and I feel proud to have been closely associated with the same.

Down the memory lane with XBS and SXUK

It was since those days when I had read the news, in the newspapers and the social media about St. Xavier's University, Kolkata being proposed to come up in New Town in Kolkata in 2017, that I had a longing to be a part of this University. Being in academics in the field of Business Management

for nearly two decades then, my elatedness grew more when I came to know that the University would start a business school as well. My penchant desire since then was to be on board with the system to contribute to the best of my knowledge and abilities in the days to come.

The cheerful dawn appeared in July 2018, when I joined as a visiting faculty and thereafter in August 2018 as a regular full time Associate Professor in Human Resource Management and Organizational Behavior in Xavier Business School (XBS). All our plans, propositions and intentions were set intensely keeping in mind the *Jesuit pedagogy* and the *Ignatian charism* of building men and women for others. The XBS runs a residential MBA program. Thus, we had put in our full effort to hold on to the reigns of the curriculum in such a manner that the delivery was both in the day and in the evening. Intricate and convoluted carving of the syllabi and drafting an innovative pedagogy in consultation with the stakeholders, viz. students and nominated experts from the industry were significant during the initial days of the school.

As we moved on to 2019, our dedication of faculty and students took us far and wide, beyond the four walls of the university towards nurturing young minds by way of fostering and initiating holistic learning in the true sense of the term. Management education should never be confined indoors; one needs to experience the business world around to get a feel of what it takes to be a manager in





The humble experiences, I gained during my brief tenure at the healthcare sector helped me to set up a basic medical facility at the university manned by trained nursing personnel. The Infirmary Unit caters to the basic medical need of our students, faculty members and other staff members of the university. However, moving a step further, during COVID-19 pandemic, our university was the only academic institution to launch a SAFE HOME for the poor and needy, free of cost in collaboration with Department of Health & Family Welfare, Government of West Bengal and Chittaranjan Cancer Hospital, Rajarhat. We had provisions for 40 beds manned by doctors, nurses and paramedical staff. People from different strata of our society applauded this noble endeavour.

I am moved by various outreach initiatives undertaken by the university to spread the light of academics to the children hailing from low-income group. I would also like to compliment the students of our university for actively participating in this venture. I was amazed to see these young children from nearby villages coming in bicycle,

parking their bicycle in a designated area, greeting their mentors and standing in a queue to be called by their respective mentors.

I have personally experienced the humane face of St. Xavier's University, Kolkata during the COVID-19 pandemic era, when we reached out with a bouquet of projects for members of our neighbourhoods by distributing daily rations, blankets, masks etc. The university also organised a successful vaccination drive for students, faculty members, staff members, construction etc. More than 700 members were vaccinated with the first and second dose of the vaccine. All of us having been reading or hearing about heart breaking news like retrenchment, pay-cuts, closure of factories, etc. But St. Xavier University has always focussed on the safety and well-being of all members. The members were asked to work from their remote locations and their salaries were credited to their respective banks on time without any deductions. All the Fathers, constantly kept in touch with all the members of the university enquiring about the health of all employees and their family members. This was a great source of motivation for being a part of this heritage institution.



Christmas Message

Jesus Christ in the eyes of Tagore

During this Christmas season I want to reflect upon Tagore's poem on Jesus Christ. Tagore has written a considerable amount on Jesus Christ and has made numerous references in his speeches and writings to Christ and to Christianity.

That the Birth of Jesus made a deep and lasting impression on Tagore is evident from his poem, '*The Child*'. It is the only major poem Tagore composed in English in July 1930 after his return from the village of Oberammergau in Munich, Germany to watch the traditional passion play held every ten years.

The poem was later translated into Bengali as *Sishutirtha* (Pilgrimage to Childhood) in *Punashca* where he hails the Birth of Jesus. This impression on Tagore's mind is further borne out by his translation of TS Eliot's '*Journey of the Magi*' (Tirtho Jatri) in search of the Divine Infant. Tagore had acknowledged the impact of Eliot's poem (1927), the obvious reason being that the scene of the Nativity seems to have deeply moved him. Tagore was profoundly influenced and deeply inspired by Ave Maria (Hail Mary) composed by Franz Schubert in 1825.

The Child is a recurrent metaphor in Tagore's poems. The passion plays coalesced in the poet's imagination, he conceived the Child in the harmony of creative impulse in the course of a night. Tagore finds humanity striving to transcend the burden of

frustration and failure, breaking, yet refusing to be defeated and persevering with the quest. Man contains in himself the spirit of his redemption and one day, the Newborn; the divine Child shall triumph towards glorious fulfillment.

The Child is in ten sections and the actions pause and heave like the eternal waves of the sea. The poem blends the cultural contexts of the East and the West, of impressionistic descriptions and profound prophecies. Let us take a glimpse at Nos 9 and 10:

"The first flush of dawn glistens on the dew-dripping leaves of the forest.

The man who reads the sky cries: 'Friends, we have come...'

The assembled crowd feels in their blood the primeval chant of creation:

'Mother, open the gate!' The gate opens.

The mother is seated on a straw bed with the babe on her lap...

They kneel down, the king and the beggar, the saint and the sinner, the wise and the fool, and cry: 'Victory to Man, the New-Born, the Ever-Living!'

The old man from the East murmurs to himself: 'I have seen!'
